Key points to note for KCSIE 2023

- Few changes for KCSIE 2023 <u>Keeping children safe in education GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> because DfE wishes to embed the changes made in KCSIE 2022.
- Remains 179 pages long with 558 paragraphs. Some paragraphs have additional sentences within them see details below. Paragraph numbering (two changes) 276 first change with one paragraph merged and one new paragraph 377. No paragraph changes in Annex A version of Part one.
- Most significant change relates to the March 2023 published standards for 'Filtering and Monitoring' (<u>https://www.gov.uk/guidance/meeting-digital-and-technologystandards-</u> inschools-and-colleges/filtering-and-monitoring-standards-forschools- and-colleges) and their implementation - a statutory requirement, In particular:
 - all staff are to understand their role in this
 - DSLs are expected to have the 'lead responsibility'

There are actions for school to take following the publication of the standard and the associated changes to KCSIE 2023

- Guidance about children 'missing education' now includes information about children who are 'absent' from education, particularly on repeat occasions or for prolonged periods.
- Where schools are used for non-school activities, those providers are now expected to meet the October 2020 guidance Keeping Children Safe in Out of School Settings (see paragraph 167). Information for schools, providers and parents can found here. <u>Keeping children safe in out-of-school settings - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u>. This covers community activities, after-school clubs, tuition, sports training and other out-of-school settings.
- If schools receive allegations related to an incident that 'happened when an individual or organisation was using their school premises for the purposes of running activities for children...the school should follow their [own] safeguarding policies and procedures, including informing the LADO' (see paragraph 377).
- Amendment relating to the February 2023 law that *`it has also been a crime to carry out any* conduct whose purpose is to cause a child to marry before their eighteenth birthday, even if violence, threats or another form of coercion are not used. As with the existing forced marriage law, this applies to nonbinding, unofficial 'marriages' as well as legal marriages'.
