Speak out Stay safe online

We have created an online programme that can be accessed and delivered in the classroom.

Our programme helps children:

- understand abuse in all its forms and recognise the signs of abuse.
- understand that abuse is never their fault, and they have the right to be safe.
- know how to get help, and the sources of help available to them, including our Childline service.



Speak out Stay safe online

There's an online assembly for:

- KS1
- KS2

There are Welsh and BSL versions available as well.



To support with the delivery of the online assemblies we have:

- An introductory film talking through the resources.
- A summary document of assembly content.
- A letter for parents/carers.
- Feedback surveys.
- Supporting resources to use *before* the online assemblies (KS2 only) and *after* for both key stages.

Teaching guidance and lesson plans

To be used **after** the online assembly by staff and there's separate documents for each age group:

- Teaching guidance for delivering the lessons
- Detailed lesson plans





In areas where we have volunteer capacity we are able to offer volunteer led face to face workshops for children in Years 5 and 6



The workshops are an hour per class and cover the following:

- Recap of the KS2 assembly
- An ok/not ok activity focussed on sexual abuse
- Guy's story activity focussed on neglect
- Speak out Stay safe kit activity.

Workshop for children aged 6-7 years (year 2)

What did we learn in the assembly?



A 30-minute volunteer led workshop is available where we have capacity for children aged 6-7.

- Recap of KS1 assembly
- Sam's story recap, recognising feelings
- Safe adults
- Childline
- Buddy Kit activity

Childline

Childline is always here for children – whatever their worry. Children can always contact a Childline counsellor:

- Through our <u>Deaf Zone</u> and <u>Sign Video Service</u> for d/Deaf children.
- Online with 1-2-1 chat or email counselling at <u>www.childline.org.uk</u>.

- We have a new <u>Buddy Zone</u> for more safety advice.
- Childline's games, are a safe way to relax and play online.

- Message boards can help young people share experiences.
- Ask Sam is a weekly series of advice letters.

Childline continued

The Childline website has an accessibility tool too, you can find out about it by clicking on the accessibility link in the 'Get Support' menu. Children can use it to:

- Read the website out to them
- Change the text size and font
- Change webpages to just text only
- Add a mask or ruler to help you focus on just part of the page
- Magnify parts of the webpage
- Translate the website in to over 120 languages



NSPCC Helpline

If you have any concerns at all about a child's safety or wellbeing, don't hesitate to contact the NSPCC Helpline.

It's never too soon to speak out when a child needs help, and whatever it is you're worried about, our dedicated NSPCC child protection specialists will be able to advise and take any necessary action.

It doesn't have to be an emergency. In fact, every day roughly half of all the calls and messages taken by our friendly team are for guidance and support. This is across a huge range of issues affecting children – from health concerns and relationship difficulties, to bullying and problems on social media.

It's not just about Primary pupils...

While **'Speak Out. Stay Safe.'** is the NSPCC's flagship platform for promoting children's safeguarding awareness, material is available to help young people keep safe up to the age of 25.

There is SEND material to help schools deliver a differentiated approach when presenting safeguarding messages to pupils.

Free lesson plans and classroom resources covering RSE, PANTS, bullying, sex and relationships, e-safety and more.



Secondary - It's Not OK

Lesson plans, films & accompanying materials help children and young people recognise concerning behaviour and identify characteristics of positive relationships Reinforces the importance of building and maintaining positive relationships and recognising and responding to behaviour relating to:

- online safety
- grooming
- sexting
- harmful sexual behaviour
- child sexual abuse
- child sexual exploitation.



Secondary – Love Life (SEND)

Activity plans, films and supporting materials helping young people (11-25) with learning disabilities develop strategies for staying safe as they grow up and gain independence.

The resources enable adults to start conversations with young people about:

- feelings
- privacy and boundaries
- friendship
- different kinds of love
- online safety.



Secondary – Stop Speak Support

KS3 & KS4: prevention of cyberbullying

Targets teenagers who are 'bystanders' of online bullying

- Encourages pupils to be good digital citizens
- Equips them with the skills to know what they should do if they encounter bullying online.



Secondary – Talk Relationships (Teacher CPD)

Speak out Stay safe SEND/ASN/ALN programme

6 session flexible programme to help your pupils understand what abuse is and provide them with strategies to keep themselves safe - including trusted adults.

- Materials intended for children with moderate learning disabilities, autism spectrum conditions or other additional learning needs.
- Schools with pupils with severe, complex and profound disabilities have successfully adapted and delivered the programme.
