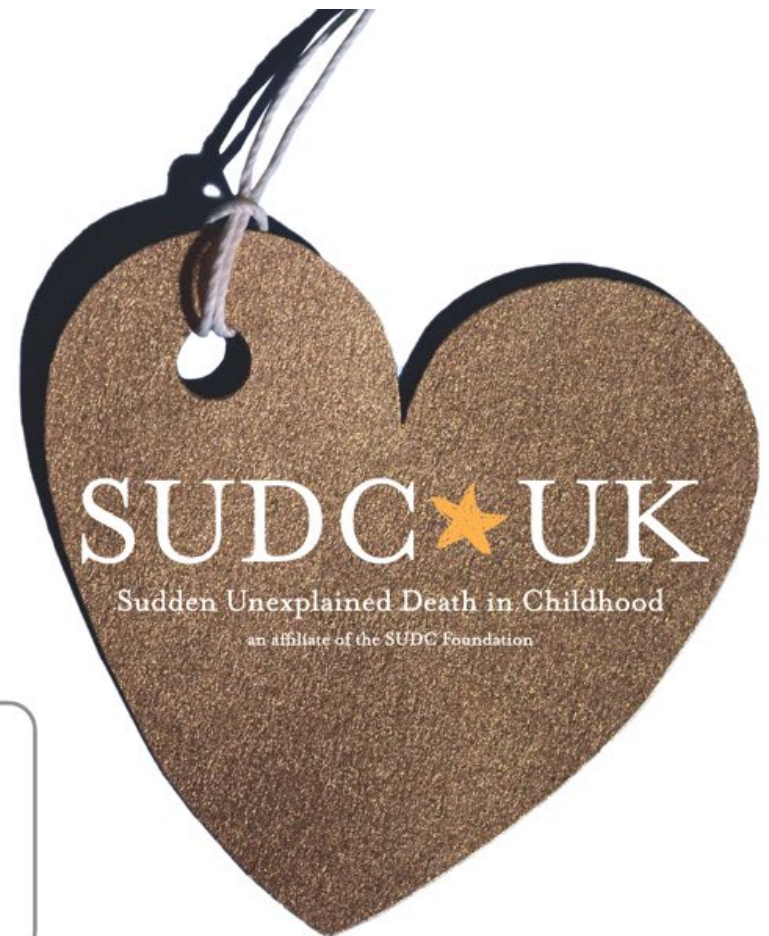

# Eyesight

Up to 75% of children performing below age related expectations have unchecked issues with their vision. Less than half of Primary aged children have ever visited an optician. Yet the majority of learning material is now presented on a board at the front of a classroom, and our increasingly indoor lifestyle is affecting eyesight more than ever. It's worth a screening test!

An easy to use vision screener for schools is available here:



Alternatively, this easy screener from the US (right, and below) can be administered quickly and easily, helping you to identify children to recommend for full eyesight tests.

The test must be printed so that the first E is 4.5 cm tall, and children should be seated 3 metres away.

## Home Eye Test

This home vision test is provided to check your vision. It is not a substitute for an eye examination and doing well does **NOT** mean that you do not need an eye exam.

Open the downloaded pdf file with Adobe Reader. You can either print the chart or use your computer monitor.


Print the eye chart on a letter sized paper 8 1/2" x 11". You must have your printer settings set to print actual size, or uncheck the Print to Fit option. Check that the big E in the eye chart measures 45mm / 1.75 inches in height.

You may also use your laptop screen, but you will need to carefully zoom in or out to adjust the letter size so that the big E measures 45mm / 1.75 inches in height.

The test is taken at a distance of 10 ft. with glasses on, if worn. Cover one eye with your palm or a piece of paper. Do not press on the eye. It may help to blink a few times occasionally during the test. Test the right eye first, then the left. The vision is the smallest line where more than 1/2 of the letters can be seen and is on the far right side of the chart. 20/20 vision is line 8, above the red line.

### Smartphone Free Childhood-Barnet

February 14th, 2025

Dear Parents/Guardians,

We are increasingly concerned about the impact of smartphones on our children. Smartphones are a big part of life today. Most adults have one. They are great for finding information and staying connected with family and friends.

However, there is now an **alarming amount of evidence and research of the negative effects of smartphones and social media on children and teenagers**. These include:

- Poor mental health, such as depression, anxiety and low self-esteem.
- Issues with cyberbullying, attention, focus and sleep.
- Exposure to dangerous and harmful content, and inappropriate material; and
- Smartphones can be highly addictive, so time spent on a device reduces time spent playing, interacting and developing vital social skills.

Children often get their first phone in primary school and over 90% of 12-year-olds now have a smartphone. This period is crucial for brain development, and the younger a child gets a smartphone, the more harm it can cause.

Schools are in a powerful position to change the norm and therefore a large group of Barnet schools have come together as we are committed to making our Barnet schools smartphone-free. Children cannot use smartphones during the school day, and **we do not want primary school children to bring a smartphone to school. Additionally, from September 2025, new cohorts of children moving to one of the secondary schools in the below list will no longer be permitted to bring smartphones or smart watches into their school for the duration of their time in Years 7-11.**

Research now indicates that age 11-15 is the age group when children are at their most vulnerable to potential negative influences from access to social media. Accessing the internet through a smartphone can pose additional risks than doing so from a more secure network in the home environment. As such, we are also encouraging all parents to delay giving a smartphone to your child until they are at least **14 years old** and to delay allowing your children access to social media **until age 16**.

A growing number of parents and schools across the country are choosing to do this and there is **widespread support from Barnet Education and Learning Service (BELS), Barnet Public Health, Barnet Headteachers/Principals and Chipping Barnet MP Dan Tomlinson**. We include a list of local schools that are working together on this campaign.

If you need to contact your child while they travel to and from school, a simple 'brick' phone is enough. "Brick" phones do not have internet connectivity, and they are inexpensive.

We are encouraging other boroughs and regions to consider similar actions because together, we can make a big difference in our children's lives.

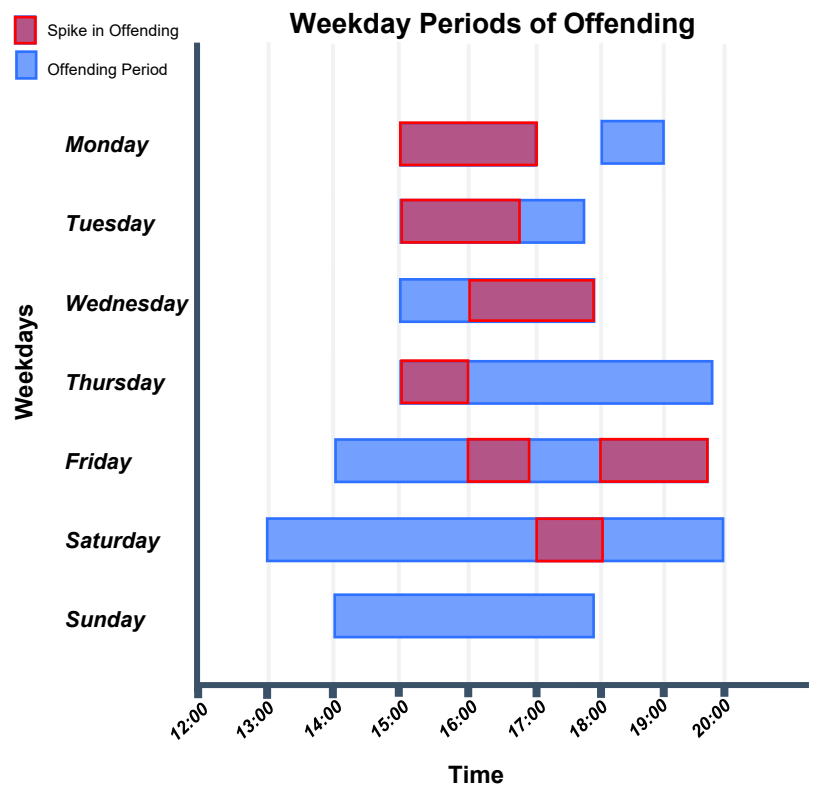
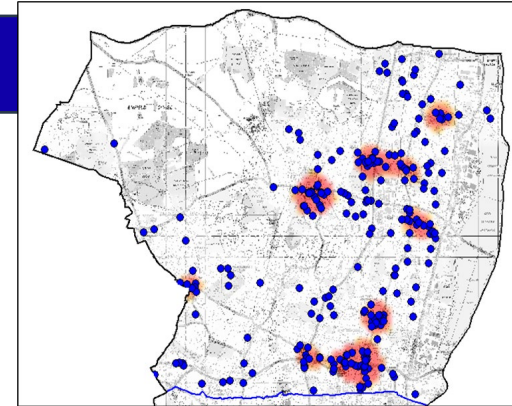

## When might you need a risk assessment?

- For an event or trip
- For a member of staff with a specific vulnerability
- For a child with a specific vulnerability
- In the event of staff or
- For a situation or area where harm could be caused, for example during building works
- Managing health infections and outbreaks
- When a specific behavioural concern or allegation has been made, for example between two students
- Whenever additional effort is required to ensure the safety of those in your care

## What should the risk assessment look like?

Any format is fine. It needs to:

- Describe the activity
- List the potential harms
- Rate the likelihood of occurrence
- List actions and procedures which you are already doing to reduce the risk
- List any further actions which could be taken
- Determine whether the activity can take place safely
- You cannot remove all risk. The role of a risk assessment is to reduce and manage risk

**Is it regarding sexualised behaviours or allegations?** Someone in your school is likely to have had Brooks Traffic Light training. Use their expertise.

## What else?

You must have a named 'competent person' responsible for maintaining health and safety responsibilities and reviewing risk assessments

You must share the risk assessment with those concerned with ensuring actions take place. It should be monitored and reviewed regularly.

You should consider whether any additional referrals might need to be made, for example to MASH, the LADO, CAMHS or other service.



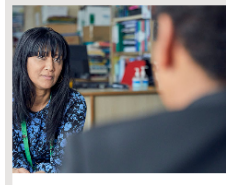
