

The support comes from the Borough that agreed the order. After three years this will be Enfield if the child LIVES in Enfield.

Until the end of March 2027, the ASGSF will have a single fair access limit of £3,000 per child per year for therapy. Specialist assessments up to the level of £2,500 per child will be considered, but only within the overall £3,000 fair access limit.

In Enfield, if additional therapy is required for children with an SGO, applications should be made via the Special Guardianship Team.

What other points should schools consider?

- Attending training on the impact of trauma and loss.
- Providing consistent key relationships for children with attachment needs (e.g. 1:1 time scheduled into the child's day or week).
- Providing support for unstructured times (e.g. lunch club or calm space).
- Special arrangements for transition (e.g. additional visits, maps and photographs and opportunities to get to know key staff).
- Consider how to support children who find it difficult to manage their feelings (e.g. teaching emotional regulation skills, having calm boxes, nurture groups etc.) Pupil Premium can be used for this.
- How the school shares sensitive information about the child's background and needs? e.g. systems; meetings; policies... if it is on a 'need to know' basis, how is this decided and clarified with everyone including parents?
- Ways of involving or engaging parents/carers.
- How to monitor academic and SEMH progress?
- Be aware that many children contain or mask their feelings at school, but then release them at home. This can cause stress to parents and guardians.

Many schools find it useful to regularly ask parents, via a school newsletter, about providing documentation of their child's PLAC status, in order to claim Pupil Premium.

What support is available?

- Children previously in care benefit from priority admission to schools. This means that even if the school is over-subscribed, they will still be awarded a place.
- Schools are entitled to claim Pupil Premium (currently £2,690 in 2026/27, for Reception to Year 11 aged children, and £655 p.a. for 3- and 4-year-olds in Early Years Provisions)
- Enfield Virtual School provide advice and guidance information to schools, parents or guardians and a range of professionals, around improving the educational outcomes of children who were previously looked after.

Why do these children need support?

Many care experienced children may have experienced grief or loss and had traumatic experiences in their early lives. Many of these children entered care due to abuse or neglect. Their needs do not change overnight, and they do not stop being vulnerable just because they are in a loving home. Their early life experiences will have a lasting effect emotionally, socially, and academically. The purpose of the Pupil Premium Plus is to raise educational attainment and close the gap between previously care experienced students and their peers.

Who are children previously in care?

Children who have been in the care of a Local Authority in England or Wales, and left care with an Adoption Order, Special Guardianship Order or Child Arrangement Order. This can also include children who “have been adopted from state care” outside England or Wales. Internationally adopted children are now also entitled to Pupil Premium, Priority admission and support from Adopt London North.



FAQs

When does Pupil Premium Plus (PP+) funding start and finish?

Any child attending school from the start of Reception Year to the end of Year 11 is eligible to receive PP. Children who are electively home educated or are post-16 students are currently not eligible for the funding. Proof of status (adoption or SG order) needs to be seen by the school, and recorded onto school systems in time for the October census.

What about Early Years Children?

Early Years Provisions can claim Early Years Pupil Premium Plus for 3 and 4 year-olds in Early Years settings.

What can the Pupil Premium be used for?

- It must be spent on the needs of the cohort of children concerned.
 - Acceleration of academic achievement and progress.
 - Helping with social and emotional needs.
 - Helping the school with training to promote awareness of trauma and attachment needs.
 - Support with transitioning to a new Key Stage or setting.
- Reducing suspensions and internal exclusions.
- Improving school attendance.

Should the Pupil Premium be used for school trips and outings?

Normally it is expected that a parent or guardian will provide the financial support for additional curricular activities. However, in certain circumstances, a school may agree to part-fund trips if there is a sound argument. The allocation of PP+ to specific interventions should be evidence based and meet the individual needs of the child/young person. The Education Endowment Foundation provide schools with evidence of high impact strategies for disadvantaged learners.

Can the Pupil Premium be pooled?

The PP+ is not a personal budget. Schools should look at the needs of the cohort of children and ensure the PP+ is spent in the best interests of these children, with engagement from parents and guardians.

What about internationally adopted children?

Children adopted from abroad are entitled to priority school admission and support from the Adopt London North. They are also entitled to Pupil Premium.

What is the Adoption and Special Guardianship Support Fund?

The adoption and special guardian support fund (ASGSF) provides funds to local authorities and regional adoption agencies (RAAs) to pay for essential therapeutic services for eligible adoptive and special guardianship order (SGO) families. The ASGSF is available for children and young people up to and including the age of 21, or 25 with an education, health and care plan, who:

- are living (placed) with a family in England while waiting for adoption
- were adopted from local authority care in England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland and live in England
- were adopted from abroad and live in England with a recognised adoption status
- were in care immediately before a SGO was made left care under a special guardianship order which subsequently was changed to an adoption order, or vice versa
- are under a residency order or child arrangement order (CAO) and were previously looked after
- were previously looked after but where the adoption, special guardianship, residency or CAO placement has broken down, irrespective of any reconciliation plans.
